

"We have meetings once a week, the core leaders run our meetings. We start off every meeting fairly casual - this can be planning our next project or reading aloud a story. Our meetings are always very fun and we try to have everyone participate equally."

This club has truly embraced every part of the MNMS lifestyle. They've pioneered and participated in a variety of projects that display leadership and a desire to serve that is incredibly powerful in a group of teenagers. Their first project, which really established their presence on campus, was a Book Drive for Anchor House, an agency for at-risk kids. They were able to collect over 1,800 books in crates set up all over their campus. and then held a "sorting party" for their team to count and organize the books while having a great time with new friends. With such a strong positive response to MNMS at their school. they were really encouraged to take their efforts out into the larger community, and make an even more personal impact. As the anniversary of Hurricane Sandy approached, they learned of Sandy Service Day. "Sandy Service Day was a truly great experience because it allowed us to really affect our own community through a very traumatic time. Hurricane Sandy demolished a lot of our own state... so people are still building."



We learned of Sandy Service Day about two weeks before the event and chose the activity "Painting Playful Playgrounds" in Surf City, NJ. The activity involved going to an elementary school and painting the blacktop with games and pictures, and assembling picnic benches. MNMS Leader Anna Kovacevich said, "All of the leaders tried something new that day. We honestly didn't know what to expect. At first, we were overwhelmed with the entirely empty canvas we had in front of us. However, we learned that by looking at the bigger picture, anything we paint on that blacktop would make the students happy- it would become part of every life of every student at that school. So, we had fun with it. It really was an unexpected delight. Who knew helping others could be so fun?"

Devika joined PDS in 7th grade, and was selected as Valedictorian for her middle school graduation ceremony. She also received the PDS Panther award for athletic ability in 8th grade. She is passionate about tennis, basketball, and track, and represents her school in Varsity Tennis and Basketball. She's also part of Mock Trial and Science Olympiad. She also tutors middle school kids in Spanish. Outside school, Devika is actively involved with Easter Seals New York, which is an organization that supports children with disabilities.



As their final event before break, MNMS @ PDS leaders decided to honor their own teachers and staff. "We had a week to write as many letters as possible...Then, on the last day before break, in small groups and during free periods, members delivered the letters to their teachers. They tried to deliver the letters without having the teacher see them, so it could be more of a surprise!


A few of the teachers who received thank-you letters from us showed their gratitude. The photo teacher, for example, taped the letter on the bulletin board outside her office. Helen Healey has a great story of another teacher's reaction: 'Well, she received our letter and approached me in the hallway. She smiled and said that she was very touched to have gotten this letter and that it meant a lot that people were thankful for her. The goal was achieved- we made someone happier. It was also touching to have someone come up to me personally and thank me for it."

All the MNMS @ Viewpoint leaders participated in this week, with Lauren leading by example. On Day 2, be kind to a stranger, she sat with someone she didn't know at lunch, and they became friends! On Day 4, give generously, she went through her closet and donated clothes that she wasn't using anymore. On Day 5. make a new friend day, she baked a cake and brought it to a new neighbor, and at the end of the week, she did all the things on the list to show her family just how much she appreciates them!

After this event, this group of change-makers continued their campaign to inspire empathy. After hearing about the idea from a teacher, the MNMS School Club @ Viewpoint decided to make Rainbow Loom bracelets for a local children's hospital. They publicized the idea at school, got a group of students together and had a great time making the bracelets, which were twice as fun to make with the knowledge that they were going to bring smiles to the faces of so many children.



Inspired by the Mix It Up days that Chaminade had where everybody sits at the colored table that corresponds with a sticker on their nametag, we tried to imitate that as best as we could with our middle school. An announcement was made that every person would wear a shirt that corresponded with a color of their birthday (ex. if your birthday was in march you wore a yellow shirt). Evelina gathered 12 upperclassmen to wear their shirts and held signs with the birthday month. Everyone born in that month would sit with their MNMS leader with the same color shirt. We were then able to divide into teams for some fun relays and prizes.





MNMS inspired me through its raw passion for helping others, empathizing with others, and making a difference whenever possible... As I learned more and more about it, I realized how perfectly this club fit with my lifestyle; I had always dreamed of a club or organization that did exactly what MNMS has been doing.

Christian, Makayla, Simran, and Ally are teens on a mission. They championed the MNMS mantra "vou can't hate someone once you know their story" and came up with a project that connected students across various grades and backgrounds.

They kicked off their school year with a Pass a Smile Week during Club Rush, to share the My Name My Story message with as many people as possible. They then partnered with an already existing program in their school to send teen leaders to Pio Pico, a local elementary school, to read to and bond with the children there.





Their first two events were small matters compared to their upcoming main event...

"Simran introduced the idea of What if Week(WIW) to us... We managed to accomplish it by asking for the help of our school's ASB and our PTSA. These two groups are involved in school activities very similar to WIW, so we knew it was a perfect combination of people and leaders.

We broke the week up into five different "What IF?" questions... questions that addressed everything from respect for their campus to "What if everyone cared?" The week was full of all kinds of activities, including a compliment wall, a Mix those of us who planned it. We It Up Lunch, and an assembly on texting and driving. Founding Leader Christian Delgado said, \*Our Compliment Wall was just one of the few activities we held during our What If Week, & it worked out beautifully, to say the least. Each student was given a mailing label and offered the opportunity to give a direct, indirect, or general compliment to someone on campus. The compliments ranged from "You're beautiful" to "You are a areat person!" & everyone's spirits were lifted after reading the positive comments that everyone had for each other. It's amazing how just a few words can make a world of difference!"

The campaign was really intended to engage the whole student body, and to get them all excited to make a difference. "It reflects the values that every student at school should hold every day. It gave more value to the term think before you do and really made the people involved in the week step back and look at their life from a new perspective."

"I believe it's safe to say that if anyone was impacted by the events held this week, it was spent time planning the whole week and figuring out what worked and what didn't ... we had been part of the domino effect that started a more empathetic and caring community of students." MNMS helps them figure themselves out. As a teenager, I have seen others judge their peers when they don't even know them, and I think that MNMS allows you to open your eyes and see that others are going through difficult things, and that you don't really know them so you can't judge them based off of what you hear.





This club's story began with a Pass a Smile Week, an idea that leaders Mariha and Stephania found in the MNMS Resource Guide they were given at Leadership Day 2013. Struck by this idea, they were determined to capitalize on it's easy execution and positive impact:


"We first brought up the idea at one of our weekly meetings. Everyone seemed interested, so we went online and ordered a bulk of smiley face pins. We distributed them to each of our members... they went on throughout the week encouraging our members to pass on a smile to anyone they saw with the hope of having our entire campus smiling! After class, a student saw my pin and told me that he wanted one. I told him that all he had to do was smile! He was a little confused at first, but once I explained our message to him he seemed impressed, and after talking to him about MNMS and about empathy, he went over and exchanged smiles with our Econ teacher, effectively explaining the same message to her. I was very proud of our progress after just two days."

After the success of Pass a Smile Week, Mariha and Stephania decided to take on a Community Activity.

We first announced the book drive to our club members, and told our teacher sponsor to announce it to her students. She is an AP teacher, and was even willing to offer extra credit to her students who brought in books. We made flyers and posted them around campus and spread the word by talking to our friends and families. We even went to a local elementary school and got a few donations from them. We collected 300 books and donated them to Olive View Hospital and to our local public library.

One student said, "There are a lot of clubs out there about community service. I feel that this is more than that. In My Name My Story, you first get to know the people that you're working with, and then you work together as friends for a common cause."

"We have weekly meetings to share stories, talk about upcoming events, and play games to inspire unity and leadership."

Hi, my name is Ajay Dodani and I am 11 years old. Amit Dodani, my brother, is the founder of My Name My Story. The first time I heard about MNMS is when my family and I were driving back from my favorite restaurant and the "idea of the century" was brought up. First I didn't know if i could belong since I did not have an "overcoming story." Then my mom told me "my life is my story."

I knew I wanted to be a part of this movement, I just didn't know how. In 3rd and 4th grade I was the photographer of MNMS and although I only took pictures I am and was very proud about how it came out. When I entered 5th grade that is when I really started to get involved with MNMS. I became Student Body President and, when the devastating Hurricane Sandy swept the East Coast with powerful winds and harsh weather, I knew that I had to do something about it. And I did.

The Hurricane Sandy book drive was brought up to a student council meeting. I talked to the Student Council proctor and I printed out around 200 fliers to pass out. Somebody had to take initiative and start up the drive. So I took a friend with me to help start everything up. We went to the front of the school to pass out fliers to the parents that were picking up their kids. The best part about that is that when I left he brought someone and they continued on going! We also had a class competition to see which class collected the most books. Well, my class won and we got to have a pizza party!

After we collected and sorted the books, my class came together and we boxed the books and we shipped them off to a school in New Jersey, an organization in China, and to local schools in need of books. In the end, we collected 3,011 books in just two weeks! Collecting all those books was great, but the impact goes beyond that too. It was so cool to get a note from a teacher at the school in NJ after receiving the books: "My students and I are so thankful to the organization for the generous donation. Now they have books to read at home, which will allow them to continue to foster their love for reading!" Brenda Rivera. One of the kids in my class was interviewed for a middle school that asked him about community service, and he realized that this book drive was his first time doing any community service and he loved it!

While I was in 5th grade I did one more project. I made a Spirit Video for my school that included different kids in my grade talking about how much we appreciate what our school has given us. I thought it was a great way to get a lot of kids together to talk about something positive, while showing appreciation to our school.

I am really excited to be an MNMS Founding Leader. We had our first ever Leadership Day where I spoke to Middle School students like me. There, I featured my favorite thing I have done so far in MNMS: help a 4 year old do a book drive. I don't want to spoil it since he is featured right after me, but Tejas is an amazing kid and truly a hero.

# 11 Year Old Ajay is a Changemaker!























What could be more exciting than youth empowering youth? The story of young Tejas M. is a vivid illustration of what a huge impact one person can make, no matter how small he or she may be!

At four years old, Tejas watched his role models Amit and Ajay Dodani work in their respective schools to get youth passionate about talking to each other and giving back to the world around them. He decided that he, too, wanted to be a change-maker and do something positive for his community; so he called Ajay and learned the step by step process of how to conduct a book drive: who to call, what to say, how to say it, etc. He set a specific goal of 100 books, and began the drive at his school. The video here documents his entire journey- how he began his work, surpassed his goal, and personally delivered the books to the hospital with his parents.

After donating the books, the fire was lit within this little soul. In November, in the spirit of giving thanks, Tejas built a Lego police helicopter and said that he wanted to give it to a police officer, to "thank him for saving us from the bad people." His parents took Tejas down to the local police and fire stations so that he could tell the officers how much he appreciated the work they do to keep all of us safe.

In December, Tejas wanted to give Christmas gifts to kids that may not be getting any. He asked his parents help to find a way to do this, and they found two kids supported by a local Child and Family Guidance Center and bought new clothes and shoes for them, so that they would really feel special this Christmas!

Tejas's parents are so proud of their son, "Teaching empathy and nurturing emotional intelligence in a child is one of the most important jobs we have as parents..

The ideas that Tejas learns through MNMS are shaping his understanding of the world. Empathy is becoming cool when a four-year-old looks to an eleven-year-old for guidance and sees the importance of listening to others, sharing what we have, and giving back when we can.

## Storytelling- MNMS @ Notre Dame High School

MNMS at Notre Dame is set apart by its emphasis on sharing stories- an integral part of My Name My Story. They have made this the central element of their meetings thus far, and have most recently been moved by the story shared by their own Founding Leader Andrew Mekhail.

Notre Dame's MNMS leaders have always admired the body of work that has been built up from time by My Name My Story. They attended the workshop at Chaminade High School and were inspired to spread what they saw to their own school. They believe in the power of empathizing, and have experienced what can be accomplished with unity and leadership. They hope to continue to expand MNMS at Notre Dame and collaborate within and outside their community.

#### This is the story as told by Andrew:

October 30th, 2013;

Two days before my sixteenth birthday, one day before Halloween. It wasn't a particularly special or unordinary day. I went on a field trip with my T.V. Production class, granted. But other than that, school was average. I expected the field trip and knew I was going for a few weeks; perhaps that's why I was so unphased.

My mom picked me up from school and after some short errands we returned home. It became apparent on my street that things were not fully normal, but I could not diagnose what it was immediately. The first thing was that the sunlight looked different. It was shining through something, so the particles in the air were much more visible. As I got out of the car to get the mail, I smelled something. A barbecue. I see my dad frantically signaling for us to get out of the driveway. My mom figured it out first, but it was a matter of a second before I realized as well.



My house was on fire.

It was ominous how quickly after this epiphany that I heard fire ambulances. It was under five seconds, to be certain, but it was closer to two. The following hours would drag on. Countless contractors, firefighters, news reporters, and photographers would be in and out of the place I used to call home. It took over 100 firefighters and 2 ½ hours to put the fire out. By then, damage was severe.

Right from the beginning, we knew that our pets would be in danger. It only added to our grief and misery when we found out that not only had our two dogs passed, but they were in the room that the fire started in. Meanwhile, the cat could not be found. We were told it was also dead, but they could not produce a body.

That night, after the fire was put out, they allowed us to go inside and see if there was anything immediately salvageable. There were some things, but what struck me was the state of the house. It was no longer a home. It looked like the set of a horror movie. There were no lights; it was pitch black because the electricity went out. The only lights were from the fire ambulance outside, who had to maintain 24-hour watch for one day to confirm the fire would not start again, and the stars. Everything else was pitch-black. I never realized before that day how wet things are after a fire. The entire house was soaked, and water ran down the stairs as if every faucet and shower was turned on and left to run for days on end. That night was spent in a hotel room. It was as quiet as it could be. I have never felt so restless.

#### October 31st, 2013;

The first day of the rest of my life. Everything was different now. My life felt like it was split into pre and post-fire categories. The outlook changed-everything was difficult to do, and any moment of relief was followed again by the memory of what happened. Although I didn't go to school, I had to stop by to purchase new uniforms, and as I went to talk to my principal, the first thing she did was embrace me. This was my first interaction with her beyond an exchange of greetings. It was incredible how much love was present. I am still amazed by it. She refused to let me pay, giving me shirts and sweatshirts and the promise that Notre Dame would be here for me. This would become as factual as the fire itself, but I did not yet realize it. The last thing I did that day was shave my head. I still don't exactly know why I did that, but it was nice to get my mind off of things. It was also nice to have a physical change to match the emotional change.

"We have meetings... once a month. they're run by the three (Founding) Leaders with students involved adding their thoughts and ideas."

November 1st, 2013. Happy birthday to me.

I went back to school. We had mass for All Saints Day, and it was shocking how surreal the scene was. While everybody was exchanging peace, all I could do was stand there. It is a strange feeling to be miserable in a room full of happy people. Throughout the day teachers and students inevitably heard, either through the principal, the news, or hearsay. Sympathy poured in. People I did not talk to told me how genuinely sorry they were. And I felt it. The support was beyond measure. I felt loved, and though that did not affect my happiness, I felt loved. It was nice. It still is. I thought about my pets throughout the day: I couldn't get my mind off the subject. It didn't help when dogs and cats came up in one of the classes. I had to walk out of the room. I didn't want people to see my reaction. I came back a few minutes later. I thought about how after two days, they still could not find my cat's body. I realized that I had to look or I would hate myself forever. So after school. I went back to the house. I looked for an hour throughout the house. Nothing.

As I was leaving, I heard the slightest of noises, the kind that could easily be produced by your own head. But then I heard it again. At this point I was frozen. Another one. I recognized that noise to be my cat, meowing. To call it a meow is inaccurate; "mew" is better. It was incredibly quiet. He was clearly hungry and thirsty. I still have no idea how he survived. It was definitely a great birthday present.

Life continued to move forward. My family came to the conclusion that we would fix the house, but we would not move back in. We would sell it and start fresh. Currently we're in an apartment in the same city, and though it is smaller, it is because of this lack of room that we are physically closer. I think that contributes to the fact that we are now closer emotionally. It is incredible how important it is to be able to appreciate your family.

Before the fire, we took that for granted. It is important to appreciate what you have before it becomes what you had. In fact, the night before the incident, my dad and I got in a fight. It was trivial; I was three minutes late to the car. I don't know how I would live if the last memory I had of him was a petty fight. He easily could have been asleep, showering, passed out because of the smoke. His life is a miracle. I would not be who I am today if not for this fire and the soul-searching that took place in the aftermath. The support I got was love that burned much stronger than the fire. I am not glad the fire happened; I am not there yet. I doubt I ever will be. But I would not be me if it did not happen.

Whatever the reaction to a story, that instant when you connect with another human being and realize that your experiences can bring you closer

I enjoy music. Very recently I took up singing and playing the guitar, and honestly I have yet to actually be good at either, but it serves as a perfect get away for me. I also really enjoy baking.

I think it's the prospect of being able to eat the finished product is what cheers me up the most.

I really enjoy working with kids. I think one of my more recent goals is to try and make sure that no child ends up going through whatever emotional turmoil I went through. If I can say that I've shown at least one person that you can come out of a depression a better person, then I've done my job. When I get older, I want to go into pediatrics.

A lot of times, people are summed up by what they wear, who they hang out with, what they look like, etc... everything is viewed in almost a two-dimensional "it is how it is" kind of way.

To me, the motto "Hope, Believe, Succeed, Inspire" is a process. You have to hope and have faith that whatever struggle you are facing will get better. You have to believe that you're strong enough to get through it, and come out of it a better person. Once you've succeeded at that, you have to inspire others and make them realize they can come out a better person too.

A book drive seemed the best idea for the first project as a club... It seemed appropriate to donate books to Hope Elementary as this is a school Raleigh Charter already had relations with Our first obstacle was trying to figure out how to advertise the book drive. We emailed all the teachers, put it in the announcements, and placed flyers around the school. We called Hope Elementary to set a date when our club could come read to the students. Hope Elementary is a small charter school in downtown that teaches many at-risk kids, many of who do not have access to a single book at home. I told them that we had gathered 117 books to offer from a school-wide book drive, and they were beyond thrilled!

MNMS @ Raleigh took their book drive to the next level. After a successful book drive, they decided that they wanted to connect personally with the children who would receive the books, so they set up a time to go and read to the kids. The relationships they will build by going and meeting with kids one on one are incredibly valuable, and both the teens and the kids will have a new understanding of what it means to be part of a community of empathetic individuals.

With the holidays just around the corner, we decided it would be a good idea to donate to people less fortunate than us... We decided to donate to a women's shelter. At this point, we had absolutely no money to do anything. We decided to hold a bake sale during lunch one day to raise money to buy toiletries for a local women's shelter. We raised over \$200 in just a 30-minute time span. We took the money and went to a local Target and Dollar Store to buy toiletries, goodie bags, and ties to put it all together.

The work being done by MNMS @ Raleigh Charter is incredibly valuable, and motivating. They seek ways to personally interact and engage with people in their community who sometimes get passed over. The focus on the personal touch sets this school club apart; they are fantastic examples of change makers in society, and they truly strive to achieve a real connection with the people they work with.




### ANDY BARKES

At that time I realized that even though I was attending a middle and high school with a tremendous emphasis on diversity, acceptance, and some national anti-bullying programs in place, most of my fellow students tuned out these programs, because they were neither being harassed nor were bullies themselves - so it just didn't concern them!

At 14, I recognized this gap in empathy, and wanted to do something about it. So, with my family and mentors by my side, I started MNMS. And as a high-school student, I very quickly understood that empathy must be cultivated in a way that kids relate to. They have to see it as something that is "cool" in today's society.

It has been an incredible journey, and one of the best part of working on MNMS has been seeing other young students latch on to the cause and make it one of their passions.
